But what about future generations? How can we ensure that they receive the same excellent care that we enjoy today?



#### DO MANY PEOPLE LEAVE GIFTS IN WILLS?

More than one million Canadians have left gifts to their favourite charities in their wills. As our population ages, that number is sure to rise. Individuals with families often find that with their children well-established, they have the ability to make this kind of transformative gift. And those without children find that they can make an even greater impact long into the future by leaving a charitable bequest in their will.

#### WHAT IF I ALREADY HAVE A WILL?

Whether you are having your first will drafted or are revising your current will, including a bequest to Collingwood General & Marine Hospital Foundation is easier than you may think. If you already have a will, there's no need to re-write it in order to include your gift. Instead, you can use a special legal clause called a codicil to amend your will after the fact, and it gives you the flexibility of choosing how to make that gift. Some choose to make a residual gift, and others choose to gift a percentage of their estate. As always, we strongly encourage you to speak with your financial planner or lawyer when making a charitable bequest.

#### WHAT IF I WANT TO HELP MORE THAN ONE CHARITY?

You can remember all of your favourite charities through a gift in your will. There's no limit to the number. Think of your estate as a pie. You can cut it into as many different sized slices as you like, some small and others large.

#### WOULDN'T IT BE BETTER TO HELP NOW RATHER THAN LATER?

Fortunately, you don't need to make a choice between making a gift now or making a gift later. Many donors choose to continue making annual gifts in addition to their intention to leave a gift in their will. Both present and future gifts are very much

needed and appreciated. There's even an option to contribute to our endowment fund, which is a fund that preserves the capital that's contributed to it, while the interest is used to support the Hospital every year.

# HOW CAN I LEAVE A CHARITABLE BEQUEST AND PROVIDE FOR MY FAMILY?

We understand that family comes first. Fortunately, there are many ways to support health care in our community through a gift in your will while also providing for your family. Some choose to do this by making a residual gift, which ensures that all of your other priorities are met before the charitable gift is made. Others choose to divide their estate into portions and allocate those portions according to their wishes.

#### DOESN'T THE GOVERNMENT COVER THE HOSPITAL'S FUNDING?

Here in Ontario, the government provides funding for hospital operating costs, such as providing medical care, medications or operating medical technology. But it's often up to the hospital itself to raise the money needed for capital projects, such as new equipment and technology. This is particularly evident at the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital where over 90% of all medical equipment & technology is funded through caring donors just like you who support our Foundation.

One Sunday morning, Martha was drying her hair and all of a sudden her arm started feeling really heavy. She figured it would pass and kept drying her hair. But it didn't pass.

As a former nurse, she knew something wasn't right, so after monitoring her irregular heartbeat for 20 minutes with no improvement, she called her friends down the street and they drove her straight to the Hospital. Thank goodness for that, because it turned out that she was experiencing atrial fibrillation (an irregular, rapid heartbeat that can increase your risk of stroke or heart failure).

"I was beautifully looked after in our emergency department by Nurse Betty and the rest of the team, and I was just so happy that my Hospital was there for me," says Martha. It was exceptional care, but it's also what she says she's come to expect from our Hospital after volunteering there for almost 20 years.

# From VOLUNTEER to PATIENT

Martha spent her early career as a nurse, then her later years as a physiotherapy assistant in downtown Toronto. It's safe to say that she's spent a lot of time in hospitals, and so she knows how fortunate we are to have the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital here in our community.

### HOW TO LEAVE A GIFT in your WILL

You've chosen to leave a legacy of exceptional community health care to future generations. How do you go about setting up your gift?

There are a number of ways that you can leave a gift in your will. The following are the most common:

- You can choose to leave a residual gift.
   This ensures that all the other commitments in your estate, including gifts to your loved ones, are met in full before the remainder is given to the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital Foundation;
- You can choose the flexibility of leaving a percentage of your estate to the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital Foundation; and
- You can leave a specific dollar amount.
   This is a good option for those who feel confident in their estate's ability to meet all their priorities.

#### **SAMPLE WORDING**

To make it simple, the following is the information you need to add the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital Foundation to your will. You can bring this along to an appointment with your lawyer:

I direct my Estate Trustee to pay or transfer (describe the gift, i.e. sum of money, article of property including sufficient detail to describe it accurately) to the Collingwood General & Marine Hospital Foundation and I declare that the receipt of the person professing to be the Treasurer or other proper office of such charitable institution shall be a sufficient discharge to my Trustees who need not see to the application thereof.

If you already have a will, a simple amendment to your will (or 'codicil') may be all that you need.
