The Giving Circle is hosting their annual meeting on October 1st. An inclusive group of like-minded women in support of the CGMH Foundation, the Giving Circle focuses on funding projects that measurably impact the quality of care provided to patients at CGMH while providing a unique opportunity for donors to be part of a decision-making process that will direct how their gifts are used. Here are the projects that are being presented at this year's meeting:

Osmometer for Diagnosing and monitoring more patients with on-site testing and timely results.

Automation reduces turnaround times and the workload for Medical Laboratory Technologists; a critical need as we face a national shortage of MLTs.

ORSIM Bronchoscopy Simulator for Enhancing patient safety and quality of care.

Cutting-edge virtual reality training device that allows medical professionals to practice bronchoscopy procedures in a realistic and immersive environment.

Ultrasound Probe for Augmenting and enhancing specialized breast imaging.

With enhanced imaging capabilities, the probe facilitates the early detection of breast cancer and other conditions, leading to more effective treatment plans and better patient outcomes.

Simulation Debrief Hardware for Optimizing performance and patient care in crisis.

CGMH leads as a destination for medical learners and practicing health care practitioners who travel to our site for enhanced training. This project is intended to improve patient care in all departments involved in acute medical crises.

Endosee Advance for the clinical evaluation and treatment of uterine disorders.

Women will have quicker and easier access to this procedure and reduce the need for intervention in the operating suite and risk of general anaesthesia.

Hospital Development - Getting Ready for Detailed Planning.

This year, CGMH has made significant progress on the hospital development project, continuing our efforts to advocate for and advance the construction of a new state-of-the-art hospital for the South Georgian Bay region. We are anticipating approvals of our current phase of planning by the end of the year.

Once we receive approval for Stage 1.3, CGMH will move into Stage 2: Detailed Planning.

During the detailed planning phase, we'll focus on refining the hospital's layout through block schematics that outline how all rooms, departments and services are organized in the hospital. This phase also establishes department layouts in more detail as well as overall building circulation and building systems. This phase of work will formalize CGMH's desired patient, family and caregiver-centred design concepts as well as overall building flow and will provide a 3D visual design of our future hospital.

CGMH is following the Ministry of Health's three-stage capital planning process. Detailed Planning (stage 2) is projected to be completed in September of 2028. From there, the construction phase (the 3rd and final phase), begins; breaking ground for the Hospital of Tomorrow!

Collingwood General and Marine Hospital (CGMH) is pleased to announce a significant advancement in our Diagnostic Imaging services with the addition of a new, state-of-the-art, X-ray machine. This latest upgrade is a key component of our ongoing commitment to providing outstanding care and meeting the evolving needs of the South Georgian Bay region.

The new X-Ray machine represents a major leap forward in our imaging capabilities. Designed to serve multiple purposes, the machine is located in a newly renovated room that supports both traditional X-Rays and Fluoroscopy. This upgrade is part of a broader initiative to enhance our diagnostic imaging services, which also includes replacing our CT machine this fall and the arrival of our first MRI in 2025.

The new X-Ray machine offers several advanced features:

Enhanced Imaging: The machine delivers clearer images through advanced computer technology, enabling faster and more accurate diagnoses.

Versatility: It can perform traditional X-Rays to identify broken bones as well as fluoroscopy images, which provide live, continuous X-Ray imaging.

Fluoroscopy Capabilities: Fluoroscopy shows a continuous X-Ray image on a monitor, similar to an X-Ray movie, allowing detailed observation of the movement of body parts, instruments, or contrast agents ("X-Ray dye") through the body.

Orthopaedic Applications: As an orthopaedic center, CGMH frequently performs joint and back injections for patients with hip, shoulder, and lower back pain. The new fluoroscopy capabilities will support these procedures and help manage patient conditions more effectively.

Robotic Features: The fluoroscopy machine is equipped with advanced robotics, making it easier for our Medical Radiation Technologists to operate.

Patient Comfort: A new patient lift has been introduced to ensure smoother and more comfortable transfers from a stretcher to the imaging table, reducing discomfort for patients with hip fractures or abdominal pain.

"This significant investment reflects our dedication to ensuring that our community has access to cutting-edge diagnostic imaging technology right here at home. The enhancements will greatly improve patient care by providing more precise and efficient diagnostic capabilities," says Michael Lacroix, CGMH President and CEO.

CT Scanner Update:

We are excited to be acquiring a state-of-the-art CT machine – the first of its kind in Canada. We will be replacing the current CT machine this fall, with the new equipment expected to be operational before the holidays. The staff at CGMH are currently preparing for the arrival of a temporary CT machine to serve patient needs during the new machine's installation.

MRI Machine Update:

Early demolition on the MRI's future home began in the summer. CGMH is working through the engineering and construction process to renovate and build the MRI suite. We estimate that the process will be completed with the MRI installed, in early 2025.

Profound gratitude for team CGMH. This is Judi Dosne's story.

As a local real estate agent and long term resident of Wasaga Beach, Judi Dosne already knows the power of community and the importance of a good neighbour. So when she recently needed care at CGMH, she was relieved and grateful to find such a supportive network that cared for her compassionately, every step of the way.

Judi is a cancer survivor and ever since her cancer went into remission, Judi has had a healthy life. This all changed a few months ago, when Judi started feeling very unwell and ended up at CGMH's Emergency Department.

When Judi arrived at CGMH, she felt confident in the care she was about to receive. "I was so impressed by the triage system in emerg. Everything was organized from the very first moment; everyone knew what they were doing," shares Judi.

After Judi was admitted to the Emergency Department, she received great care from Dr. Serena Deketele, who immediately realized this was a rare case and made the decision to admit Judi into the hospital and to call one of CGMH's internists, Dr. Mark Bonta.

"When Dr. Deketele told me she was going to call Dr. Bonta, I was apprehensive to know that this was going to be a complex case. As soon as Dr. Bonta arrived and started observing my condition, I was relieved and happy to see that instead of being thrown by my mysterious condition, Dr. Bonta was eager to get started on the challenge of figuring out what was going on with me," recalls Judi.

It wasn't too long before Dr. Bonta diagnosed Judi with a rare condition called Vasculitis GPA (Granulomatosis with Polyangiitis),

and contacted a specialist right away, to get her on the right treatment path. "I was so amazed by the professionalism of everyone involved in my case. The nurses, doctors, lab technicians, every single person who I came in touch with was so qualified - even the food was delicious," shares Judi. Among these incredible healthcare professionals was one of CGMH's Pharmacy Managers, Mishka Danchuk-Lauzon. According to Judi, she was instrumental in getting access to the medication that helped her start her recovery journey.

A few weeks after Judi was released from the hospital, she had to come back to the Emergency Department; her condition had taken a turn for the worse. The internist on call that day was Dr. Mike Randazzo, who was able to stabilize Judi and expedite her visit to the specialist Dr. Christian Pagnoux, which was still a few weeks away.

"I was so impressed by the way Dr. Randazzo and the whole team cared for me. Also, while in the hospital I had to share a room with other patients and ended up meeting two wonderful people who I still keep in touch with. I am not just grateful for the care I received from the healthcare team at CGMH. I am also grateful for the friends I made along the way," says Judi.

These positive experiences prompted Judi to make a donation to the CGMH Foundation in honour of all the healthcare workers who cared for her. Not only did Judi want to give back, but she also saw the need for hospital equipment. "It was an eye opener," Judi reflects. "When I had to be transported to Barrie for an MRI scan, and I learned that hospital equipment is mostly funded by community donations, I knew I had to get involved."
