With 80% of our current facility originally built in the 1950's, dense infrastructure means that we cannot renovate to meet current patient care standards and there is no room to expand.

The challenges of delivering exceptional care in our environment are compounded by so many things: access to state-of-the-art technology, recruitment of medical professionals and specialists, and proximity to regional centres. Our staff, physicians, nurses and volunteers care deeply about this community. They've spent years pushing past the limitations and obstacles that come from working in an aging and overflowing facility. Despite growing challenges, they've introduced innovative programs and technologies that have allowed the hospital to deliver uncompromised care. They've been taking care of today, but now we need help to take care of tomorrow.

To support this critical community project, we have launched the \$100 million campaign to build South Georgian Bay's Hospital of Tomorrow.

We are working to build the new hospital that South Georgian Bay needs and deserves and we know that this community will be here to support it. This newsletter is filled with stories to prove it. We are so fortunate for the support that comes to this hospital. Whether it is sharing a story, being a monthly donor, or hosting an event, our community of support shows up time and time again to ensure that our healthcare teams can continue to deliver the best in healthcare. Spotlight on the Seligmans.

Peter and Dianne (McDermid) Seligman have been supporters of the hospital for over a decade, and their dedication stems from personal experience and a strong sense of community.

Peter's connection to Collingwood goes back to the 1960s. He used to visit with his family as a child and, nearly 29 years ago, bought a home here. In 2020, he moved to Collingwood permanently due to COVID-19, enjoying an active lifestyle including skiing, cycling, and spending time with family.

Dianne's family is deeply rooted in Collingwood. Her mother, Judy McDermid, a nurse from Guelph, moved to Collingwood and began working at CGMH in the early 1970s after meeting Dianne's father at a ski club. "She worked in the ICU, then in central supply, and eventually became head of admitting and discharge planning. It was through this role that she helped set up the hospital's hospice program, starting with just one bed," recalls Dianne.

For Peter and Dianne, supporting the hospital is more than just donating; it's about ensuring that the hospital can deliver outstanding care to the community. "From birth to the end, to everything in between, the hospital is needed," Peter says.

Peter and Dianne understand the need for a new hospital in South Georgian Bay and how greatly it will impact the community, meeting the needs of the area's growing population. Having personally relied on the hospital's services, they recognize the pressing need for a larger, more modern facility to address future healthcare demands. "We will have five or six grandkids running around," Peter says. "It will be a busy house, and more people using the hospital means the need for great healthcare is even more important."

To raise awareness and support for the new hospital, Peter and Dianne hosted and sponsored an entertaining evening garden soiree in their beautiful home and breathtaking backyard. They invited friends and acquaintances from various social circles, introducing more people to the hospital campaign and its significance to the community. 

Thanks to your generosity, the CGMH Foundation is bringing the latest technology in diagnostic imaging equipment for better, faster diagnosis, close to home. Every piece of equipment we purchase brings us closer to delivering the highest quality care here in South Georgian Bay.

CGMH, one of the first hospitals in Canada to offer cuttingedge technology with our new CT scanner.

CGMH's new CT scanner is now in use and making a real difference in patient care. This advanced technology delivers enhanced resolution, faster scan times, reduced radiation exposure, and a more patient-friendly design to improve patient experience.

MRI Suite Construction Underway

In 2023, through your generosity, we purchased CGMH's first MRI machine. This machine will offer exceptional image quality, efficiency, and speed while providing a patient-friendly design for better care and ultimately better patient outcomes. Installation of the MRI involves several space, electrical, and magnetic safety requirements. With limited space available, careful planning and consideration has been taken by the

CGMH team, architects, and engineers to choose the best location. After two months of construction, foundational work has been completed, electrical, plumbing, and fireproofing systems are now in place, and framing will soon begin. We are looking forward to the arrival of the equipment in fall 2025 and will keep you informed on the progress along the way.

Funds raised for two new Mammography Units

Once again you have demonstrated your unwavering support for CGMH, raising over \$2.1 million for two new mammography units, ensuring our community has access to the very best in breast cancer screening and care. These units will provide clearer, more detailed images, allowing for earlier and more accurate detection of breast cancer.

A Story of hope & gratitude.

David Barrett is a charismatic, lively family man whose passion for skiing and golfing keeps him healthy, happy, and fit. When he started having a series of headaches that wouldn't go away, he thought this was quite unusual, and brought it up with Dr. Richard Cornell, his family physician, who promptly ordered a CT scan to rule out anything concerning.



After the scan was interpreted early on a Sunday morning, CGMH Radiologist Dr. Michael Carstensen called David, inviting him back to the Radiology Department. David, nothing if not consistent in his love of the outdoors, being active, and spending time with friends, assured the doctor he would come to the hospital, right after a hike with some friends.

Dr. Carstensen however, insisted he come to the Emergency Department urgently for a CT angiogram to provide more thorough imaging of the blood vessels supplying David's brain. This was when David realized that things were much more serious than he anticipated.

This second test confirmed what Dr. Carstensen had suspected on the first exam – David had a large aneurysm (an enlarged blood vessel with the potential for rupture), an incidental finding likely unrelated to his headaches. In fact, it was the largest intact aneurysm he had seen in this location.

Dr. Carstensen referred David to the CGMH Emergency Department immediately after the study was completed where an urgent neurosurgery consultation was arranged. David was promptly seen at St. Mike's Hospital in Toronto and a nonsurgical interventional procedure to treat the aneurysm was performed two weeks later.

The two weeks between David's diagnosis and his procedure were scary. But this was also a time David used for deep introspection and reflection. He reached out to loved ones, had heartfelt conversations with them, talked about hopes and fears, bringing them closer to each other. It felt like life was giving them an opportunity to say goodbye. During this period, David had the chance to think about all he had accomplished and the legacy he was leaving behind. He took this time to rethink his priorities and truly appreciate the people and experiences that really mattered to him.

When the wait was over and David had his procedure, he and his entire family were relieved to learn it was very successful. David was out of danger, with no major complications. He was grateful to be alive and to have received such excellent care. And those two weeks of connection and conversation with friends and family? Those will continue. Having that time to truly express his love and gratitude will forever be part of David and his family.

Remembering Doc Paul.

To say that Dr. Donald J. Paul was a pillar of the CGMH family would be understating the impact he had on our Hospital and our community. Right up to his passing in December 2024, Doc as he was affectionately known to his friends, had a hand in just about every important project that went on in Collingwood.

Don Paul moved to Collingwood in 1960 with his lovely wife Joan, continuing his career as a general practitioner. He was born and raised in the South Porcupine area of Northern Ontario. Don loved the small-town life of Collingwood and the sense of camaraderie and mutual respect he found in the Medical Staff at CGMH. It wasn't long until he identified a significant need at CGMH and he left his general practice to return to Medical School to complete his in-depth training in Radiology. He returned to CGMH as Chief of Radiology in 1975, a position in which he served with distinction until his retirement in 2002.

During his time at CGMH, Don also actively served on the Board of the CGMH Foundation and took on leadership positions in a variety of capital campaigns. After his retirement, Don continued to be a source of guidance and motivation in numerous fundraising projects.

As generous donors themselves, Don and Joan understood the significant impact the community's support had on patient care. They used their knowledge and expertise to educate and inform those around them on the critical importance of medical equipment and technology – especially Diagnostic Imaging technology, Don's favourite topic.

Almost 25 years after his retirement, Don could walk through the halls of CGMH and still be greeted with affection and respect by so many physicians and staff. His imprint on CGMH is indelible.

"Don was an amazing mentor and a true friend," says Jory Pritchard-Kerr, CGMH Foundation President & CEO. "His passing leaves a hole in the fabric of our community but the lessons he taught us about community engagement and support will never fade."
